Pastor's Desk

In the Gospel reading today, the kingdom of God is likened to a treasure buried in a field and to a fine pearl. Jesus sees the search for God as central in our journey of life. What we are asked to seek is the most important in life, that which gives meaning and helps us make sense of our lives. The kingdom of God is the "pearl of great value" worth more than all we have gained in our human experience. The challenge for all of us is to become signs of God's kingdom through our love for God and our neighbours. When the Spirit of God fills our hearts, our capacity to love expands to all nations, all ethnicities, all people, especially those who have not had a place at the table.

Sometimes, however it is not until something we value is threatened, that we realise just how precious it is. The destructive impact of Covid 19 on our health, our families, our economy, our way of life, has been felt throughout the community of Aotearoa, New Zealand and the global community. This time has taught us to be a team of 5 million, to be kind to each other, to discover how important our connectedness is to each other and our environment, to look out for each other, to be willing to be the human face of Christ to each other. The Black Lives Matter Campaign also provided a powerful example of the Kingdom of God going to those who were hurting, who'd been denied a place at the table, who had been cast out of community and said 'You Matter.' The life and ministry of Jesus gave us the vision and capacity to love so we can break down the religious and cultural walls that have long divided people.

Throughout history, we have inspiring examples of people who sought to live lives that matter, that continue to make a difference in the world. Nelson Mandela's vision was for a peaceful, more equal society in South Africa and at great sacrifice for what he believed in, he committed to human rights for all. Striving for dignity for the poor dying on the streets of Calcutta, and around the world was where Mother Teresa experienced the Kingdom of God. In Aotearoa New Zealand, Dame Whina Cooper's vision was that everyone would live in harmony and share the wisdom from each culture, as she fought for better health care and for the future of our children.

As we live with faithfulness, gentleness, gratitude, aroha, integrity, understanding and compassion, and embrace the gifts of diversity, interconnectedness, interdependence, and communion in our community, we too have the opportunity every day to be God's love in action and attitude.

Liturgical Matters

Last week we announced that we had been given permission to return to the previously suspended liturgical rituals and practices. Communion is now being offered from the chalice, the Sign of Peace with a handshake, blessed water in the font and communion on the tongue. We asked that you personally decide what you are comfortable doing and whatever you choose was the right choice. Thank you everyone for your continued support of the changes and for respecting each other's decisions.

Reminder: Public Safety is still a communal concern. We need to be diligent in keeping safe health practices and respectful of other people's safety. If you are sick, please refrain from coming to Mass. If a person does not want to shake hands, please continue to acknowledge them in some other way. If you are able, please continue to receive communion on the hand. Please do not use the water font if you do not wish to.

Reintroducing these rites and actions will continue unless Public Health requires them to be suspended again. Each parish has been given the discretion to restore these practices as and when they see fit, so each parish will be different.

Reflection – 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time

1st Reading: 1 Kings 3.5-12++, 2nd Reading: Romans 8.28-30 Gospel Reading: Matthew 13.44-52 Responsorial Psalm: Lord, 1 love your commands.



For the past two Sundays, and again today, we have heard the parables in Matthew's Gospel that begin "The kingdom of heaven is like..." We are told that even those closest to Jesus, his disciples, had trouble understanding not only what he was trying to teach but the way in which he was talking to the people. They would have known it was an important topic – after all he was describing something beyond their imagination, something of which he spoke about with great authority.

But the deeper meaning of his simple parables was often lost on them. However,

they were privy to his explanations, his postscripts for their ears alone. As readers of these gospel accounts, we too are enlightened by the teachings of Jesus as recorded and by the distilled wisdom of the centuries. But we can become complacent having heard the stories many times. To 'hear' with new ears gives us the opportunity to go deeper into the mystery of the kingdom, the 'something' beyond our imagination.

I read a short reflection by a priest who turned the two parables of today on their head and asks the question - what if the one who found a great treasure in the field or a magnificent pearl, the one who sold all they had to possess that treasure or pearl, what if that one is not us?

"God is the unnamed person who is preoccupied with purchasing the field. God is the merchant who is infatuated with obtaining the precious pearl. Most importantly, God tells Jesus that for the buried treasure and the precious pearl no cost is too great, not even his life. This makes us the valued treasure. This makes us the precious pearl." Listen all you have ears!
